

Latinos are in the news, as immigrants, as "hard workers," as the group that could shape our elections. The title of this book understates its value and the intelligence behind it. It isn't a random collection of numbers (stats) and facts - the authors are good editors, who give us enough of a framework for the facts to make sense, and who "curate" the facts, picking the most salient ones as opposed to drowning us in numbers. If I am going to have a discussion about Latinos, about immigration, or about politics in the United States, I'm going to have this (on my Kindle) with me!

The changing demographics in the US and the growing Latino population has been a media touchpoint for years, providing soundbites for the cacophony of election night pundits, immigration polemicists, and culture warriors. This book gives you not only the real numbers, but also the nuanced analysis necessary to address what can seem like an overwhelming topic -- one that cuts across national identities, economic impacts, and every key policy decision in the near future.
