

Mikhail S. Blinnikov is Professor of Geography and Graduate Coordinator at St. Cloud State University in St. Cloud, Minnesota. He is a native of Moscow, Russia, and has traveled widely and conducted extensive fieldwork in the former Soviet Union. Dr. Blinnikov $\tilde{A}$ ¢ $\hat{a}$  ¬ $\hat{a}$ "¢s research and publications focus on the late Pleistocene biogeography of grasslands; phytolith analysis; remote sensing/geographic information systems; protected natural areas and green spaces in and near cities; young-naturalist movements and nongovernmental organizations; and Orthodox religious landscapes.

Recently, I've read eight geographies about Asia, Central Asia, China, and Russia. The publication dates range from four years ago to almost seventy years ago. No two of the books were written in the same format. All the books differed significantly in the material they covered to such an extent that I'm not at all sure what should or should not be in a geography book. All, however, were full of useful information and I learned a great deal from them. For me, though, this book, A Geography of Russia and Its Neighbors, is in a class by itself. It's very well written. The author, Mikhail Blinnikov, has produced a splendid text that includes Review Questions, Exercises, and Further Reading. The sources for his facts are scrupulously noted. And while he now teaches in the United States, he grew up in and was educated in the Soviet Union and lived through the transition to the current Russia. He understands modern Russia as only a Russian can. He covers everything from geology, history, and society to industry, life in the cities, life in the villages, and the role of the Military. He discusses Russian Literature and Russian Art, both traditional and under the Soviet Union. There

are special sections called "Vignettes" which highlight particular aspects of Russian culture, life, history, geography, etc. They are very instructive and fun to read. I could go on, but I could never do justice to the remarkable amount of information that Professor Blinnikov has found room for in the approximately 440 pages of text in his book. He even finds space to tell us what to visit in Russia and why. By now I hope I've made it clear that this is more than a geography book. This book is also about culture, economics, ecology, education, history, social criticism, and much more. I thoroughly enjoyed reading this book, and while I did, I developed a healthy respect for the character and integrity of the man that I believe comes through in his writing. It's clear that there was much that he disliked about Russia's former Communist government and there is much that he dislikes about the governments that have succeeded that one. But he is not blind to the achievements of the Soviet Union, nor is he afraid to point them out. He is a Russian who is proud of his land and his people and he explains very well, at least to me, why this is so.

This is reference source which you would consult again and again (as different questions arose in your mind) rather than book that you would read, then shelve and let gather dust. Its real very interesting and fascinating - Russia is such a vast land-mass and is populated by such a variety of different ethnic groups with their different languages and customs. The geographical variations alone would make the book interesting and useful. Its a book which would interest the curious and who would want to 'broaden' their horizon.

This is, for now :-), the definitive book on Russia, for westerners. If you think you'd like to know more about any aspect of Russia, or any part of it, you should pick up this book and you'll find what you need. This is not a tourist guide, though. This is a book for people who want to learn about Russia, away from the media garbage. Well worth it's fairly high price. This book is interesting to read not only as a text-book. I have learned a lot about my home country from it. It is very well illustrated (although only in b/w, it would be nice to have some pictures in color). Statistical data are presented in nice diagrams which are easy to understand with references to reliable sources.

The book gives a really fine review of the geography of the past USSR but it includes also a historical review which, except some stereotypes, is really good. I'll keep it jealously!
