

He also explains how you can use these principles in re-creating artifacts and in creating your own Celtic designs for art and craft work or even for recreational use. Step-by-step procedures carefully introduce the simple rules and methods of Celtic knot work and the well-known designs from the great manuscripts and stone work. Later chapters build up to complex knot work, spiral work, and key pattern designs, with special coverage of alphabets and the stylized use of animals, humans, and plants. George Bain clearly demonstrated in his classrooms, to judge from pupils' work here illustrated, hat through practice and application in his methods of constructing decoration, anyone with the initial interest can release this innate interest to beautiful and mark out the impress of their individuality that has been a quality in man since the Neolithic times of the cave artist and still finds expression through the subconscious outlines of the phone-pad doodler.

Working in celtic artwork or engraving is an art that can take a lifetime to master; a fact the author makes clear indirectly throughout this work. Nothing quite compares to celtic knotwork for

complexity and detail, nor is as difficult to master. This book is the best place to begin learning how to draw, or etch this style of work.

The book illustrates many techniques for creating Celtic patterns. Some of the text is interesting, but it is dry and stodgy, especially for children who it says is the intended audience. The diagrams are good but about half the resolution they should be. Much of the text in them is barely legible. For the price, the ebook is a good value. Though there are some quality issues.

This book is great reference material. It's very clear and if you want something that is more outlines and less finished designs this is perfect. It shows you how the designs are intended to be interwoven, allowing you to start from the simplest and build up to more complex options. Some of the illustrations are perhaps a little small considering the level of detail but being that this is part of a series this is a good book to begin with. Definitely worth considering buying additional books from the series to complete the collection if you're looking to pad your reference library. I would like to have seen a few small finished designs, the infinity bands are great but they don't join up as finished pieces so you do have to use your brain a little to puzzle out how to join them up if you're not going to use them on a wrapping design. Other books in the series do have them so it's curious that this one is so concentrated on long bands instead.

This is an older book published by Dover, and it is full of knotwork and ornament patterns, instructions on how to do them, variants, and all sorts of goodies. Now here's the thing you may not know about why it's so grand that this is an older book: the designs and research are based on Celtic artifacts, like stone carvings. Environmental factors are causing these to degrade rapidly, so that we can't see detail today that we could see easily 40 years ago. George Bain was able to work with and preserve the details of designs that we've largely lost. So, whether you simply like Celtic things or if you're a serious historical artist struggling to find good source material for the original designs used in the past, this is a great book at a very low price.

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
